January 14 Answers

- Today we read about the first <u>disciples</u> of Jesus (John 1:35–51). The word "disciple" (*mathētēs*) means "learner, pupil, <u>follower</u>." Being a disciple means entering into a <u>relationship</u> with the one you are following. Our calling as Jesus' disciple is to follow Him, learn from Him, and <u>obey</u> Him.
- One of the two disciples who left John the Baptist and followed Jesus was **Andrew**. Andrew was from **Bethsaida** of Galilee. His father was John the fisherman and his brother was **Simon** (Peter).
- The other disciple who left John the Baptist to follow Jesus was **John**, the author of this gospel.
- Andrew found his brother and said, "We have found the <u>Messiah</u>!" (which means <u>Christ</u>). The
 word itself is a transliteration of the Hebrew word meaning "the <u>Anointed</u> One." The OT backdrop
 for today's reading is <u>Psalm 2</u>. Jesus is the <u>Anointed</u> of Yahweh, the <u>King</u> of Israel and the <u>Son</u> of
 God.
- Being a disciple of Jesus means **persuading** others to follow Him. We're supposed to be out there saying, "Come and see!" just like Nathanael, just like Andrew.
- Jesus looked at Simon, Andrew's brother, and said, "You are Simon the son of John. You shall be called <u>Cephas</u> (which means <u>Peter</u>)." Cephas is the transliteration of the Aramaic word for "<u>rock</u>". The equivalent Greek expression is <u>Peter</u>.
- Philip was the first disciple who was directly **<u>called</u>** by Jesus. Philip was from **<u>Bethsaida</u>**, just like Andrew and Peter.
- Nathanael was from <u>Cana</u>. Nathanael's name is not in the lists of the twelve apostles that are given in Matthew 10 and Luke 6, and this has led many to identify him as <u>Bartholomew</u>.
- Philip told Nathanael, "We have found him of whom <u>Moses</u> in the Law and also the <u>prophets</u> wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Jesus is mentioned in <u>Deuteronomy 18:15</u>—"The Lord your God will raise up for you a <u>prophet</u> like me from among you…"
- Jesus said to Nathanael, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no deceit!" Jesus's point is: "Behold, a descendant of **Jacob** the **deceiver** in whom there is no deceit!"
- Jesus said, "You will see greater things than these. Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man." This statement alludes to Jacob's vision of the ladder between heaven and earth (Gen 28:12). Jacob understood the vision to mean that God had come down from heaven to earth. Indeed, Jesus was exactly that—the Messiah, the Word of God incarnate, come down from heaven to earth.
- 'Son of Man' was Jesus' favorite way of telling people who he really was without actually saying, "I am the <u>Messiah</u>." The title comes from <u>Daniel 7:13–14</u>. The Son of Man is none other than the Messiah of Psalm 2, the King of Israel, and the Son of God incarnate.
