- 1) In his third and last speech to Job, Eliphaz claimed that God didn't care about Job's righteous life (Job 22:3), and he accused Job of specific sins (Job 22:6–9). Eliphaz then warned Job that he would be utterly destroyed if he didn't turn to God in repentance. Job ignored Eliphaz's accusations, but he responded to Eliphaz's call to return to God by crying out, "Oh, that I knew where I might find him!" (Job 23:3). Job was convinced that even though he didn't know where God was, God knew the righteous path he had taken (God knows I'm innocent!). Job then vented his frustration at how often the wicked go unpunished.
