## **February 5 Answers**

1) God began to <u>test</u> Israel the moment they left Egypt. Knowing they would turn back if they faced <u>war</u> with the Philistines, God deliberately led them to a place where they would be <u>trapped</u> between the Egyptian army and the sea. This teaches us that God may lead us into <u>desperate</u> situations in order to test our faith. The Israelites <u>panicked</u> at first, but Moses told them, "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the LORD" (Exod 14:13). Then "by <u>faith</u> the people crossed the Red Sea as on dry land" (Heb 11:29). When the Egyptians tried to follow, God drowned the entire army. This teaches us that when we're confronted by such circumstances, we should put our <u>trust</u> in God and <u>wait</u> for His deliverance. God delights to show Himself strong on behalf of those who fear Him (2 Chr 16:9). The awesome miracle at the Red Sea should have shown the Israelites that God was trustworthy, but only <u>three</u> days later, they were grumbling about the bitter water of Marah. This teaches us that witnessing <u>miracles</u> does not produce great faith. Instead, great faith is forged in the furnace of <u>adversity</u>. It comes from a settled conviction that God can and will keep His word (Luke 7:1–10). Sadly, Israel had to learn from repeated experience that God was able to provide for them. God recorded these events so we can learn to trust Him the <u>first</u> time. By focusing on God's <u>faithfulness</u> in the past, we can face crises with confidence rather than with doubt and fear.
