Solomon Secures His Throne (c. 969t/968t BC)

1 Kings 2:13-38

Adonijah's Last Attempt to Gain the Throne

- 13 Adonijah the son of Haggith came to Bathsheba the mother of Solomon, and she said, "Are you coming in peace?" He said, "Peace."
- 14 Then he said, "May I have a word with you?" Then she said, "Go on."
- 15 He said, "You know that the kingship was mine and that all Israel had set their face toward me as king, but the kingship turned around and became my brother's, for it was from Yahweh for him to have it.
- 16 Now one request I am asking from you, and you must not refuse me." Then she said to him, "Go on."
- 17 He said, "Please speak to King Solomon, for he will not refuse you, so that he will give to me Abishag the Shunnamite as wife."
- 18 Then Bathsheba said, "Very well, I will speak to the king concerning you."
- 19 Bathsheba came to King Solomon to speak to him concerning Adonijah, and the king got up to meet her, bowed down to her, and then sat on his throne. Then he set up a throne for the king's mother, and she sat on his right.
- 20 She said, "I have one small request I am asking from you. Do not refuse me." The king said to her, "Ask, my mother, for I will not refuse you."
- 21 Then she said, "Let Abishag the Shunnamite be given to Adonijah your brother as wife."
- 22 King Solomon answered and said to his mother, "Why are you asking Abishag the Shunnamite for Adonijah? Ask for him also the kingdom, for he is my brother, older than I; and *ask* for him also Abiathar the priest, and for Joab the son of Zeruiah." [2 Sam 16:21–22]
- 23 Then King Solomon swore by Yahweh, saying, "Thus may God do to me and thus may he add, if Adonijah hasn't spoken this thing at the expense of his life.
- 24 So then, as Yahweh lives, who has established me and seated me on the throne of my father David and who has established for me a dynasty as he promised, then surely Adonijah will be put to death today."
- 25 King Solomon sent through the hand of Benaiah the son of Jehoiada, so he struck him, and he died.

Abiathar is Banished

- 26 To Abiathar the priest, the king said, "Go to Anathoth, to your field, for you deserve to die, but on this day I will not kill you, for you carried the ark of the Lord Yahweh before David my father, and because you endured hardship in all the hardship that my father endured."
- 27 So Solomon banished Abiathar from being priest to Yahweh, thus fulfilling the word which Yahweh had spoken concerning the house of Eli in Shiloh. [1 Sam 2:27–36]

Joab is Executed

- 28 When the message came to Joab (now Joab had supported Adonijah but had not supported Absalom), he fled to the tent of Yahweh and grasped the horns of the altar. [Exod 21:12–14]
- 29 It was told to King Solomon that Joab had fled to the tent of Yahweh and was beside the altar. So Solomon sent *word* to Benaiah son of Jehoiada, saying, "Go and fall upon him."
- 30 So Benaiah went to the tent of Yahweh, and he said to him, "Thus says the king: 'Come out.'" And he said, "No, for I want to die here." So Benaiah returned a word to the king, saying, "Thus Joab spoke, and thus he answered me."
- 31 Then the king said to him, "Do as he spoke; fall upon him and bury him, and so you shall remove the innocent blood that Joab

shed from on me and from on the house of my father.

- 32 Yahweh will return his blood on his head, because he fell upon two men, more righteous and better than he, and he killed them with the sword, even though my father did not know it; *namely* Abner son of Ner, commander of the army of Israel, and Amasa son of Jether, commander of the army of Judah. [2 Sam 3:27; 20:10]
- 33 And their blood will return on the head of Joab and on the head of his descendants forever, but for David and his descendants and for his house and his throne, *there* will be peace forever from Yahweh." [2 Sam 21:1–14]
- 34 So Benaiah son of Jehoiada went up, and he fell on him and killed him, and he was buried in his house in the wilderness.
- 35 Then the king appointed Benaiah the son of Jehoiada in his place over the army, and the king appointed Zadok the priest in place of Abiathar.

Shimei is Confined to Jerusalem

- 36 Then the king sent and summoned Shimei, and he said to him, "Build yourself a house in Jerusalem and live there, but you must not go out anywhere whatsoever from there.
- 37 It shall happen that on the day you go out and cross over the Wadi Kidron, know for certain that you will surely die. Your blood will be on your head."
- 38 Shimei said to the king, "The word is good that my lord the king has spoken to me; thus will your servant do." So Shimei lived in Jerusalem many days.

Solomon's Political Alliance With Egypt (c. 969t/968t BC)

1 Kings 3:1; 9:16

- 3:1 Solomon intermarried with Pharaoh the king of Egypt, and he took the daughter of Pharaoh and brought her to the city of David until he finished building his house, the house of Yahweh, and the walls of Jerusalem all around.
- 9:16 Pharaoh, the king of Egypt, had gone up and captured Gezer and burnt it with fire. He had also killed the Canaanites who were living in the city and had given it as a dowry to his daughter, the wife of Solomon.

The First Demonstration of Solomon's Wisdom (c. 968t BC)

1 Kings 3:16-28

- 16 Then two prostitutes came to the king, and they stood before him.
- 17 The one woman said, "Please my lord, I and this woman are living in one house, and I gave birth, with her in the house.
- 18 It happened on the third day *after* my giving birth, this woman also gave birth, and we *were* together. There was not anyone with us in the house, only the two of us *were* in the house.
- 19 Then the son of this woman died in the night because she laid on him.
- 20 So she got up in the middle of the night, and she took my son from beside me while your servant was asleep, and she put him in her lap, and she put her dead son in my lap.
- 21 When I got up in the morning to nurse my son, behold, he was dead! When I looked closely at him in the morning, behold, it was not my son whom I had borne."
- 22 Then the other woman said, "No, for my son is the living one, and your son is the dead one." The other kept on saying, "No, for your son is the dead one, and my son is the living one," and so they argued in front of the king.
- 23 Then the king said, "This one is saying, 'This is my son, the living one, but your son is the dead one,' and the other one keeps saying, 'But no! Your son is the dead one, and my son is living!"
- 24 So the king said, "Bring me a sword," and they brought the sword before the king.
- 25 Then the king said, "Divide the living child into two, and give half to the one and half to the other."
- 26 Then the woman whose son was the living one spoke to the king because her compassion was aroused for her son, and she said,

"Please, my lord, give her the living child, but certainly do not kill him!" The other one was saying, "As for me, so for you! Divide him!"

27 Then the king answered and said, "Give the living child to her, and do not kill him; she is his mother."

28 When all of Israel heard the judgment that the king had rendered, they stood in awe of the king, because they realized that the wisdom of God was in him to execute justice.

Solomon's Government (c. 968t BC)

1 Kings 4:1-19

The King's Court

- 1 King Solomon was king over all Israel.
- 2 Now these are the officials who were his: Azariah the son of Zadok was the priest.
- 3 Elihoreph and Ahijah, the sons of Shisha, were the secretaries; Jehoshaphat the son of Ahilud was the recorder.
- 4 Benaiah the son of Jehoiada was over the army, and Zadok and Abiathar were priests.
- 5 Azariah the son of Nathan was over the governors, and Zabud the son of Nathan was a priest, an advisor to the king.
- 6 Ahishar was over the palace, and Adoniram the son of Abda was over the forced labor.

The King's Governors

- 7 Solomon had twelve governors over all Israel, and they sustained the king and his palace, each one was to sustain for each month of the year.
- 8 These are their names: Ben-Hur was in the hill country of Ephraim.
- 9 Ben-Deker was in Makaz and in Shaalbim and in Beth-Shemesh and Elon of Beth-Hanan.
- 10 Ben-Hesed was in the Arubbot; Socoh and all the land of Hepher were his.
- 11 Ben-Abinadab was in all of Naphat of Dor; Taphath the daughter of Solomon was his wife.
- 12 Baanah the son of Ahilud *was* in Taanach and Megiddo and all Beth-Shean which *is* beside Zarethan below Jezreel, of Beth-Shean up to Abel-Meholah up to the other side of Jokmeam.
- 13 Ben-Geber was in Ramoth-Gilead; the villages of Jair, the son of Manasseh which are in the Gilead were his, and the region of Argob which is in the Bashan, sixty great cities, with walls having crossbars of bronze, were his.
- 14 Ahinadab the son of Iddo was in Mahanaim.
- 15 Ahimaaz was in Naphtali; he moreover also had taken Basemath the daughter of Solomon as wife.
- 16 Baanah the son of Hushai was in Asher and Bealoth.
- 17 Jehoshaphat the son of Paruah was in Issachar.
- 18 Shimei the son of Ela was in Benjamin.
- 19 Geber the son of Uri was in the land of Gilead, the land of Sihon, the king of the Amorites, and of Og, the king of Bashan; one governor which was over the land.

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Chronological Notes

- 1) The demise of Shimei fits nicely within the narrative framework of 1 Kings 2 and its theme of the consolidation of Solomon's power. However, strictly speaking, his death did not occur until "three years later" (1 Kgs 2:39)—after the foundation of the Temple had been laid (1 Kgs 6:1; Ziv 967t BC). Therefore his fatal mistake will be presented later in the readings.
- 2) Abiathar was deposed and banished very early in Solomon's reign (within the first four years). His inclusion as priest in 1 Kings 4:4b is likely due to respect for the significant role he played during the United Kingdom era—thus the list should not be considered as having been made prior to his banishment.
