March 28 Answers

1) The division of Canaan at **Shiloh**. Shiloh was in **Ephraimite** territory, about 20 miles northwest of Gilgal, and God had chosen it as the place to put His name and dwelling (cf. Deut 12:5). Shiloh was located in the center of Canaan. It was a convenient location where the Tabernacle would remind the people that the key to prosperity and blessing was worshiping and serving God. The entire congregation of Israel assembled at Shiloh, and Joshua rebuked the seven tribes who had not taken steps to possess their territory: "How long will you put off entering to take possession of the land which the LORD, the God of your fathers, has given you?" (Josh 18:3). Each passing day was a day lost in obeying God's command, a day their enemies could use to strengthen their defenses. Their delay was probably due to several reasons: (1) They were tired from the years they had just spent defeating the Canaanites; (2) They were used to following Joshua and reluctant to take the initiative; (3) They realized that possessing the land meant separating from the group and fighting on their **own**, and (4) They felt there was plenty of **time** to obey God—a little delay wouldn't hurt. This teaches us the importance of not growing weary in doing good, "for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" (Gal 6:9). It also shows us that character cannot be fully developed in a group setting. Each individual must stand on their own and prove that they will obey God in spite of hardship and adversity.
