1) The murder of Ish-bosheth and David's coronation ceremony at Hebron. This was the <u>third</u> time David was anointed king: first he was privately anointed by <u>Samuel</u> (1 Sam 16:13), then he was crowned king of <u>Judah</u> (2 Sam 2:4), and finally he was anointed king of all <u>Israel</u>. It had taken almost <u>20</u> years for God's promise to be fulfilled, and during those years, David waited patiently on God. This teaches us the importance of <u>patience</u> in Christian ministry and the need for <u>preparation</u> before we can be successful in the tasks God has given us. God's promises are worth waiting for, even when His timetable doesn't match our <u>expectations</u> or desires. David's success as king was due in no small part to the <u>mighty</u> men who supported him. Within his army were two elite groups: the "<u>Three</u>" and the "<u>Thirty</u>" (2 Sam 23; 1 Chr 11). These men showed <u>bravery</u> in battle as well as <u>wisdom</u> in leadership. This should motivate us to seek out strong believers who will hold us <u>accountable</u> and help us be successful in our Christian walk. David <u>inspired</u> his men to achieve the impossible and fulfill their true potential. His example is a model for us to follow in our homes, our churches, and our communities.
