1) The fall of Jerusalem is the context of Ezekiel's famous "Gog and Magog" prophecy (Ezek 38–39). The people of Judah had lost their homes, their city and their temple, and they had been exiled to the land of their conquerors. Why give them a vision of another invasion? Because in the future, the nations who gathered together to conquer them would be destroyed. Why? Because in that day, Israel would be living in obedience to God. This taught the people that their true security lay in their commitment and loyalty to God, and it teaches us the same lesson. When we follow God with our whole heart, we can rest securely in his love. God said, "Though I say to the righteous that he shall surely live, yet if he trusts in his righteousness and does injustice, none of his righteous deeds shall be remembered, but in his injustice that he has done he shall die" (Ezek 33:13). This is a sobering reminder that saving faith is not the act of a moment but the attitude of a lifetime. We must have a present, living faith!
