September 6 Answers

1) In the twenty-fifth year of the exile of Jehoiachin, God showed Ezekiel the Millennial <u>temple</u>. An angel took him on a guided <u>tour</u> of the complex, carefully measuring each section so he could remember and "<u>declare</u> it to the house of Israel" (Ezek 40:4). Why? (see Ezekiel 43:7–10). God wanted this vision to <u>convict</u> the people's hearts and make them <u>ashamed</u> of their wickedness. This vision also teaches us that God cannot dwell in a place that is <u>defiled</u> by idolatry and sin. In the same way that persistent, unrepentant wickedness caused God to leave the temple (1 Kgs 9:3), such rebellion will cause God to leave the <u>heart</u> of a person who will not remain loyal and obedient (1 Kgs 9:6–9). This revelation of the future should <u>stir</u> our hearts with desire. It should motivate us to <u>reject</u> temptation and <u>cling</u> to God in love, for who wouldn't want to be a part of what God has in store!
