October 28 Answers

1) The rich young ruler believed eternal life could be obtained by what he <u>did</u>, and he was especially interested in some good <u>deed</u> that would guarantee his place in the Kingdom. Jesus asked him: "Why do you call me good? No one is good except <u>God</u> alone." Jesus was trying to help him see that goodness is not something that can be achieved by an effort of the <u>will</u>. It comes only by being <u>united</u> with the source of goodness—God. If the man truly believed the <u>implication</u> of his words—if he really thought that Jesus was God—then he would want to be Jesus' <u>disciple</u>. But the young man didn't see Jesus' point, and so Jesus continued by talking in terms of what the man was focused on: "what must I do." Jesus told him to "<u>keep</u> the commandments" and listed those which dealt with <u>relationships</u> with others. He concluded with a summary statement, "You shall <u>love</u> your neighbor as yourself" (Lev 19:18). Jesus used the <u>law</u> to remind the young man of the importance of love, for his real problem lay in the fact that he loved his <u>possessions</u> more than he loved God and others.
