1) Pentecost was significant in several ways: (1) It was the fulfillment of God's promise to pour out the Spirit on "all flesh" in the last days; (2) It was a sign which God said would precede the coming judgment and wrath of the "day of the Lord"; (3) It authenticated the message and ministry of the apostles and gave them power to preach the gospel in Jesus' name; (4) It inaugurated the church, which is the union of all believers in Christ through the Spirit; (5) It was the beginning of the fulfillment of Jesus' promise that the Spirit would teach the apostles "all things" and help them remember all that He said (leading to the writing of the NT); (6) It was the first display of the spiritual gifts which are given to believers through the Spirit for the edification and building up of the church. Peter's sermon at the temple was an stirring example of how the Holy Spirit empowered the apostles to be mighty in word and deed (Acts 3:25–26). Peter rightly pointed out that the "seed of Abraham" (Gen 22:18) was the resurrected Servant, Jesus (cf. Isa 42:1–4), and he told the Jews that the blessing which was promised to Abraham was the blessing of "turning every one of you from your wicked ways" (Acts 3:26). Jesus is the promised "seed" that will "bless" the nations of the earth by saving them from their sins.
