## **November 21 Answers**

1) Having argued from the Scriptures that salvation is by grace through faith in Christ alone (Gal 3–4), Paul now wanted to ensure that the Galatians' liberty did not become a license for their flesh (Gal 5). He wanted them to understand that freedom from the law was not the freedom to do whatever they wanted; rather, it was the freedom to **serve** one another "through love" (Gal 5:13b). Paul then explained how the Galatians could live a life of love for one another: "But I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh" (Gal 5:16). Following the leadership of the Spirit eliminates any need to be "under the law." What the law cannot do, the Spirit can, and where the law is limited, the Spirit is not. The Galatians were "Law-less" but not "lawless," for as they followed the Spirit's leading, He would empower them to love each other and fulfill the law's requirements (cf. Matt 22:35–40; James 2:8). Paul continued by urging the Galatians to obey the Holy Spirit, for He would enable them to bear spiritual fruit. This teaches us that walking in the Spirit is not passive but active. We should not 'coast along' waiting for the Spirit to produce love and joy in our lives. Rather, we should live a Spirit-directed, Spirit-empowered, and Spirit-pleasing life. Paul concluded by encouraging the Galatians to persevere in the faith (Gal 6). He did this by giving them practical examples of how to edify the body and reminding them of the reward that comes from enduring to the end.
