## **November 25 Answers**

1) Paul's second letter to the church in Thessalonica. Paul first dealt with the timing of the Day of the Lord (the seven-year <u>Tribulation</u> period). He told them that Day must be preceded by a final <u>apostasy</u> and the coming of the "man of <u>lawlessness</u>" (2 Thess 2:3). Paul next addressed the <u>spiritual</u> condition of the Thessalonian believers. He assured them that they were "brothers beloved by the Lord," chosen as "the <u>firstfruits</u> to be saved," and he encouraged them to "stand firm and hold to the traditions that you were taught by us" (2 Thess 2:13–15). This meant they should <u>admonish</u> those who had become idle and <u>imitate</u> Paul's example of hard work. Those who did not obey should not be fed by the others; instead, they should be <u>avoided</u> (2 Thess 3:6–10). This teaches us two lessons: (1) we need to carefully <u>examine</u> any claim concerning the timing of the Tribulation and make sure it's in harmony with Scripture, and (2) we need to be focused on <u>working</u> hard and providing for our families, not on doomsday scenarios and fears about the end of the world.
