## **December 11 Answers**

1) When God sent Ananias to restore Paul's sight, he told him that Paul was "a chosen instrument of mine to carry my name before the Gentiles and kings and the children of Israel" (Acts 9:15). The time had come for this to be fulfilled, and in the space of about two years, Paul shared the gospel with Felix, Festus, and Herod Agrippa II. Paul took full advantage of his situation, and he reasoned with Felix and Drusilla "about righteousness and self-control and the coming judgment" (Acts 24:25). This teaches us several lessons. First, it reminds us that God desires "all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim 2:4). Second, it challenges us to be bold in our interaction with others. Paul was not hostile or offensive, but neither was he timid in preaching the gospel. Third, it teaches us the importance of integrity, for Paul refused to give Felix a bribe.
