	they would love and obey God, He would bless and prosper them (Deut 15:4–6). However, God			
	knew this woul	d not be realized; inevital	oly the of sor	ne would affect the lives of
	all, and thus the poor would never cease from the land (Deut 15:11). This law was not telling the			
	people to give aid to the _	who had incur	red God's wrath (cf. 2	Chr 19:2; Amos 4:7).
	Rather, it was encouraging Israel to care for those who had been adversely affected by the results of			
	the fall and the sin of others. If we aid those who are poor as a result of their own sin without			
	confronting them about th	eir need for repentance,	we become an	of their sin. Our
	obligation is to our hand to the poor, while at the same time exercising			
	toward the root cause of that poverty.
