## **April 13 Questions**

1) When God chose Saul as Israel's first king, He gave the people a king according to \_\_\_\_\_ desires. This time God chose a king for \_\_\_\_\_\_, one who would do His \_\_\_\_\_\_ (cf. 1 Sam 13:14; Acts 13:22). The Bible is filled with commands that relate directly to (e.g., Exod 28:42–43; Deut 22:5; 1 Pet 3:3–5; 1 Cor 11:4–6). Rather, it means that people are more than how they on the outside, and that proper judgment always takes a person's into account. Further, since our physical appearance is the only part of us that many people ever see, our outward appearance plays a significant role in our \_\_\_\_\_\_ to the world. We should dress in clothing that is \_\_\_\_\_\_ for a Christian, with a godly sense of \_\_\_\_\_\_ and selfcontrol (cf. 1 Tim 2:9). Samuel anointed David as king, but for the moment, things remained —he still kept his father's sheep. This teaches us that God's \_\_\_\_\_\_ is often different than ours. We need to \_\_\_\_\_\_ patiently on Him for direction. Eventually God honored David in the sight of all Israel by giving him a great victory over Goliath of Gath.
